Dear Mr. Locher:
I was contacted by regarding the MPIA request thatsubmitted on Monday. A copy of request is attached. I understand that you told that a response to request for the recent appraisal of the former site of the fire station at York Road and Bosley Avenue, now the site of proposed development known as Towson Station, would be sent to within thirty days.
That's an absurd response, but typical of what I have come to expect from Baltimore County submitted request in person at the County office building and, after was given the customary runaround, met with you. I am not sure what the point of getting a County lawyer involved is if the lawyer isn't going to give the custodian the proper legal advice: As you know, the necessary implication of §4-349 of the General Provisions Article of the State Code is that the County is required to allow inspection of a real estate appraisal of property owned by the County. The law on the issue is 100% clear.
In other words, a custodian who respects the spirit of the MPIA would have allowed to inspect this readily-available document on the spot. If you send me a PDF copy by email attachment, I will make sure that gets it without any further inconvenience to caused by the County's general hostility to disclosure of public records.
I thought it interesting that you toldthat should expect a response within thirty days. The law of course requires the custodian to give the applicant for a public record the reason for the delay if production of the record is going to take more than <i>ten</i> working days — a provision of the law that, in my experience, the County never follows. I'd love to hear the reason why the custodian can't produce this appraisal within ten days.
